TARGETED ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Nordoff Robbins Music Therapy:

The Nordoff Robbins music therapy service has delivered therapy to 91% of pupil premium pupils in the academic year 2023 - 2024 either in small groups or individually. The impact of this service results in greater self-confidence, freedom of expression, an improvement in self-esteem through performance and develops key skills such as controlling situations, listening and turn taking as evidenced through pupil case studies. A direct link to improved pupil progress across broader areas of the curriculum is evidenced through B Squared assessment system.

Music and The Deaf

The Music and the Deaf project has delivered one to one bespoke sessions to four pupils in the academic year 2023-2024. The focus of the sessions has been to develop self esteem, confidence, self expression and social and emotional development. The teaching of these key skills link directly to the curriculum subjects PSHE, PSED and Social, Emotional and Mental Health.

Pupil Engagement:

Pupils have direct access to the Pupil Engagement Lead role which results in minimised behaviour escalations, improved engagement in the learning process and better outcomes for low level sensory processing and behaviour management. Out of the 45 pupils with 'Me at My Best' plans 24 are pupil premium children. The plans are now well embedded so that all staff can support pupil premium children with identified and specific strategies. The plans are routinely reviewed and adapted accordingly. Teacher feedback and pupil data evidences the impact of the plans.

Inclusive Enrichment Experiences – School trips | Access to Local Community | Cultural Experiences:

The school has provided a schedule of key enrichment activities throughout the year and pupils have benefitted from experiencing a range of interactive experiences linked directly to the school's curriculum topics; this has been both in and out of school. The development of Forest School has resulted in 100% of Pupil Premium pupils attending weekly sessions throughout the school. Forest School develops many keys skills which link to key areas of the school curricula, particularly SEMH/PSED/PSHE.

The family Liaison team has continued to work together and with external professionals to support families.
